



MARIST UNIVERSITY ENGLISH LANGUAGE EXAM

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The Marist University English Language Exam

In accordance with the Marist University’s regulations (specifically the one entitled “Manual de Titulación y de Examen Profesional 2012”, Article 4.c), before getting a degree, all the students have to demonstrate their proficiency in the English Language.

There are two ways to do it: first, you can present one of the following Diplomas: a current TOEFL (543-626 points); the Preliminary English Test (Level B2, score 160 and 170), a First Certificate in English, a Certificate in Advanced English or higher.

Second, through the internal exam (which has a “First Certificate in English” level or 543-626 points of a TOEFL). This exam is offered once a month (please check the [Schedule January – May 2017](#)).

Cost and registration

The Marist University English Language Exam has a cost of \$500.00 (five hundred pesos 00/100 M.N.). Ask for your payment code at the UMA Administration: Building “C”, third floor. Then, you can pay at any local branch of Banamex. Remember to keep your receipt!
