The Marist University English Language Exam

In accordance with the Marist University's regulations, before getting a degree, students must demonstrate their proficiency in the English Language. (*Reglamento Específico para la Obtención del Título de Licenciatura, Art. 2*).

There are two ways to do it:

First, you can show one of the following Diplomas:

- A current TOEFL (543-626 points) certificate.
- First Certificate in English, a Certificate in Advanced English or higher by Cambridge or by Oxford
- CENNI (Certificación Nacional de Nivel de Idioma) by SEP, B2 level.
- Certificate of English Score by British Council B2 level. (you can download the app on your mobile)
- OTE: Oxford test of English level B2

Second, through the UMA's English Language Exam (which has a B2)

Note: The Language Center will offer the English exam in the facilities of computer laboratory, on the dates and times indicated paragraphs below (**check the Schedule August – Nov 2025**).

Cost and registration

Written: through Eduma, the platform to carry out the test.Skills: listening, reading and use of English, which maximum duration will be 2 hours.During the exam you must show that you have (B2) or higher level.In order to give transparency to the exam, you must show your ID (INE or Uma's credential)
